





COALEY COMMUNITY SHOP

At the AGM on August 7th, there was open discussion, In order to gage the view of the members about whether the shop should continue to stock Cigarettes. Comments were collected via questionnaire sheets to determine future direction on sales, the Committee decision will be displayed in the shop in early September. COMMEMORATING BELL RINGERS WHO DIED IN WORLD WAR I

As published previously the Wotton under Edge Branch of the local ringing association are ringing quarter peals to mark the centenaries of the deaths of local ringers who lost their lives in the First World War. Three bell ringers from Coaley lost their lives in that conflict.

July 29th 2016 marked the 100th anniversary of the death of Nelson F Griffin, 12th Bn., Gloucestershire Regiment, and August 19th 2016 the death of William C Pegler 10th Bn., Gloucestershire Regiment.

On both dates a half-muffled quarter peal was rung.

The third bell ringer to lose his life in that war was William Charles Pegler of the Gloucestershire Regiment serving with the 8th Service Battalion who was killed on the 5th August 1917 aged 23. He was also a member of the church choir and at the time the family home was Oatridge House. A half-muffled quarter peal was rung on the Coaley bells in the afternoon of the 5th: those participating were Peggy Collett and Mark Wray from Cromhall, Dave Clark from Chipping Sodbury, Fen Marshall from Tortworth together with Terry Clark, Matt Lorkin and Terry Chivers of Coaley.

News for October 2017

This month I need to tell you all about some changes that are going to happen soon. The Village and Community Agent scheme is combining with Social Prescribing to become a new service called Community Connectors. Village Agents have been working across the county for 11 years and have helped thousands of older people and communities gain better access to services and information as well as providing support and assistance to those who need it most. Over the past 4 years, Social Prescribing has offered GP practices and other health care professionals a mechanism for referring patients who are in need of alternatives to prescribed medicines. The schemes have evolved tremendously over the years, building up networks of referral partners and gaining vital knowledge about the areas in which they work.

Community Connectors will be accessible in each district of Gloucestershire with 5 providers delivering the new service. The Independence Trust will deliver the new service in the Stroud area. The contracts for Community Connectors will begin on 1 October. Until then existing Village Agents like myself will continue to take referrals and visit clients. We are in a period of change but have been assured that over the coming months things will evolve into the new service in as smooth a way as possible. I will soon be in a position to publish the relevant contact details so that readers will be able to get in touch with the new providers direct.

I also have some information about the **Cotswold Vale Talking Newspaper**. If you would like to receive your local newspaper in audio form or if you, or a friend or family member, are visually impaired and unable to read the newspaper, then this service will be of interest to you. The Cotswold Vale Talking Newspaper is a group of volunteers based in Dursley, Berkeley and Wotton. At their studio in Kingshill House they record the Gazette together with other publications onto memory sticks every week and post them, free of charge, to visually impaired people throughout the area. New listeners are given a free sound box if needed, which is very easy to use and there is plenty of help to get people started.

There are numerous dog bins scattered throughout the village, but dog owners are still failing to clear up dog waste. The pavements and the grassed verges through out our village are being soiled and spoilt!! This is not only unpleasant and unhealthy but is an offence that can be punished with a hefty fine. Anyone who sees a dog owner failing to pick up their dog's waste and dispose of it appropriately can report this person to the dog warden 01453 766321 or the neighbourhood warden 07779 347113. We urge all pet owners to carry a 'pooper scooper and biodegradable bags' and dispose of their pet's waste either in the designated bins or in their own refuse bins. Please try to keep our village tidy and clean. Flies and other pest insects can also increase when pet waste is disposed of improperly, becoming a nuisance and adding another vector for disease transmission.

All pets should be regularly wormed to minimise the spread of parasites and disease such as the following:

- Campylobacteriosis- a bacterial infection that causes diarrhea in humans.
- Salmonellosis- the most common bacterial infection transmitted to humans from animals. Symptoms include fever, muscle aches, headache, vomiting, and
- Toxocarisis- roundworms transmitted from animals to humans. Symptoms include vision loss, rash, fever, or cough.
- Use biodegradable bags if you pick it up in a bag - some will decompose in just over a month
- Under no circumstances should you leave the bag of poo on the ground, or worse, in a tree or hedge.
- Farm animals can also become infected by parasites from dog waste and in some cases this may cause the animal illness resulting in it's slaughter. So clear up after your pet even when walking in fields
