NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH UPDATE



Following the open meeting on the 8th July, although there were fewer attendees that were hoped for it was agreed to proceed with registering Coaley as a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. Once registered residents, the scheme's registration link will be made public and any resident interested can register, whether to be actively involved or they just wish to have an interest and receive alerts and guidance.

We will have a further open meeting and invite our local police and PCSO officers along for introductions and discuss how we can work together with developing the scheme in the next couple of months.

We also discussed 'SpeedWatch' and there was interest in developing this along with the Neighbourhood scheme as there is a connection in the area of Anti-social behavior. There was interest express in the purchase of portable VAS (vehicle automatic Speed) detection equipment of the kind that Uley has along their main road. This will be taken back to the Parish Council for discussion.

Our Nature Mornings continue to thrive, bringing people together and raising awareness about how we can all care for our local environment.

In June, we teamed up with the Wildlife Trust to host a Bioblitz on the Rec – children and families took part in surveying local insects. We'll be sharing the fascinating results with you very soon!

July's Nature Morning focused on Bees, with support from the Stroud Beekeepers. We learned all about how to support our buzzing friends and enjoyed some fantastic hands-on activities.

Looking ahead:

 August's Nature 'Morning' will actually be a special evening walk to discover the world of Bats and see these mysterious night-time creatures in action.

Meet on the Rec at the Sensory Garden at 8.30pm (2nd August) to learn about bats, use bat detectors to track them, and find out how you can help them thrive locally.

A magical experience for children and adults alike – bring a torch and your curiosity!

• September's Nature Morning is all about Hedgerows – the wild larders and hidden homes of our countryside.



Learn how to spot what's safe to forage (and what to avoid!), get inspired to make treats like sloe gin and elderflower cordial, and discover the wildlife that relies on these living boundaries.

We'll also explore how to care for hedges and look at who's hiding in the hedgerows around Coaley.

Sensory Garden – Blooming Beautiful

The first stage of the Sensory Garden is now complete – and it's looking absolutely stunning (see cover picture). The flowers are in full bloom, bursting with colour and fragrance. It's quickly become a favourite spot for people to sit, relax, and enjoy the peaceful setting. If you haven't visited recently, we really encourage you to come and see it for yourself.

Once upon a time Coaley village stretched from Coaley Peak to the River Severn, reputed to be the longest village in England. Coaley Peak is our landmark and our heritage. Couly Pike in1639 'where to beholde young Men and Maids asendinge and descendinge, and Boies tumblinge down'.

Given to the National Trust in 1956 the nature reserve sits uncomfortably either side of the Frocester Hill Road somewhat separated from the village.

Look out from the misnamed topograph (there is a story here!) and the history

Cam Bridge where the last of the Viking hordes were flushed from Britain. Edward the second and Berkeley Castle, Henry II's mistress Fair Rosamund of Frampton, William Tyndale born at Slimbridge, Queen Elizabeth I slept at Frocester. The River Severn itself, the Ship Canal and the docks at Sharpness. The Wildfowl Trust, the Severn Bridge, Power stations, the Motorway and the Great Incinerator.

Chris had many tales to tell both happy and sad including being saved from drowning after his mother had dreamt this would happen (he couldn't swim) and the Severn bridge disaster to the stories of captains and colleagues and time in docks. He enjoyed his time on the river and was passionate about the work though later joined the Fire service. When he retired he returned to his first love on the river delivering grain between Sharpness and Tewkesbury. Chris writes books about his experiences and also has a voutube channel.

We had our cafe open during the Fete in June and what a lovely day this was . Thank you to everyone for supporting us and thanks to all those invovled in organising such a great village event.

In June the good weather continued for our visit to Coaley Mill grounds where lots of conservation work has been undertaken. This was an event for members and a guest and Guy Goring greeted everyone and took us on a tour of the 3 lakes which have been put in

place over the years . The lakes are surrounded by numerous trees and Guy told us that when others may have been sitting down after Sunday dinner, his parents would be out planting trees and this happened for years and Guy has continued this with forests planted around the village. Wildlife enjoy the surroundings and apart from the obvious swans and ducks, there are otters, pine martins, snakes and many many more. With 32 of us walking around in the sunshine, the wildlife were wisely keeping out of sight.

A number of our members attended an Event at Berkeley where the WI is working in partnership with agencies all over Gloucestershire to raise awareness of all forms of violence against women and girls. Speakers from Gloucestershire's Domestic Abuse Support Service and Gloucestershire Rape and Sexual Assault Centre described the work they do and explain how WI members can provide support and raise awareness of this important issue. A range of items were donated to the Refuge at the event
