#### COALEY PARISH COUNCIL

Coaley Parish Council are looking for three councillors to join us. We have been operating with just four of our full complement of seven councillors since the start of the year. This makes our continuing operation challenging in dealing with all the business we need to, such as supporting CRAG it the redevelopment of the recreation ground. Ensuring that we have sufficient members to meet our quorum and enable meetings to held legally is proving difficult on occasion. The situation is unsustainable and we can only continue with reduced numbers for a limited period of time before we must consider our future.

Gloucestershire county is a 'Parished 'county which means that it has, at the most local level or bottom tier of local democracy, parish and town councils to support local residents. Towns and parishes have the same powers, however due to their smaller scale parishes tend not to fully exercise them. There are exceptions, such as Cam which has a hall, planning committees etc., employs staff and operates very much as a town council would.

If we are unable to attract additional councillors before our next AGM in May 2026 we will start the process of considering our merger with a neighbouring parish, probably those within the same ward Uley or Nympsfield, or possibly Cam parish councils. This will impact the voice of Coaley residents depending on which parish we potentially merge with diluting

it on Coaley village matters, but gaining a voice on another village's affairs.

A reminder of some of the things the Parish Council does, or could do with more councillors.

- Engage with local organisations and residents on issues or ideas they have to improve the village.
- Statutory consultee on all planning matters in the village.
- Develop a Neighbourhood Plan which has planning powers.
- Provide and administer three allotments in the village.
- Provides grants to local organisations.
- Ensure footpaths and related signposts are maintained.
- Inspect and report Highways issues and maintain verges if required.
- Provide litter bins and control of litter.
- Oversee the recreation ground.
- Act as trustees on the Recreation Ground Charity.
- Legal requirement to have a Biodiversity plan.
- Maintain bus shelters.

We meet 11 times a year, each month but no meeting in August, to discuss the above.

#### SCHOOL REPORT

Autumn Term has been busy and exciting! Several Year 6 pupils were delighted to be invited to visit the Cotswold Home Development site in the village. It was a wonderful morning where the children learned about planning, building processes, materials and machinery. In the new year, we will be launching a design competition in partnership with Cotswold Homes as they have kindly asked for our children to design the 'child bedroom' of the show home. This is a very exciting opportunity and Cotswold Homes have very kindly agreed to gift some generous prizes for the winner and runners up.

Since establishing our Eco-Council in

September, they have been particularly active with their mission of making Coaley a more sustainable school. They organised a non-uniform day to raise funds for their mission and we reached out to Highfield Garden World to see if they could help us too. I am delighted to share that they very generously donated a huge bag of daffodil bulbs, 100 planting pots and numerous bags of compost so that every child had the opportunity to plant some bulbs to take home. We also planted several bulbs in beds around school which will make school beautifully colourful in the springtime. In addition to this, our Eco-Council visited Highfields earlier this term and purchased additional bulbs, planters, bug hotels and the highlight of their visit was the purchase of three Venus





Fly Trap plants (one for each class) which the children are most excited about!

The visits certainly didn't stop there! Our School Council Team have been exploring support in the community and visited our local foodbank in Stroud. They learned about the impact of volunteers and the donations to this incredible charity. The children were tasked with packaging different parcels in preparation for their wider distribution during their visit. The children returned to school buzzing with facts and information which they later shared with the wider community. They are using this information to pursue their mission of collecting items which the foodbank is most in need of to help our wider community.

As always, our annual 'Coaley Fireworks' was a huge success, and we raised a phenomenal £1247. I would like to share a huge thank you to our FOCS committee as well as everyone who came along to support and to those who helped tidy up after the event.

Autumn Term is always a very special time of year as we begin to celebrate the festivities of the season in the build up to Christmas and prepare for our Christingle and Carol Service. We welcome all villagers along to our services in Church to celebrate with us. We hope to see many of you there.

## RECYCLE YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE

#### Help Longfield Hospice – Booking Open Now

Now is the chance to sign up to dispose of your Christmas Tree in the most eco-friendly way possible and raise money for Longfield Community Hospice.

## A FEW THOUGHTS FOR NEXT YEAR.

If you are considering planting a hedge, think of birds, insects and hedgehogs. Hedges mean food and protection. Bushes such as pyracantha, blackthorn, holly and hawthorn etc. are good for this (they will also deter burglars)! A small hole in opposite sides of your garden fence will allow freedom of movement for hedgehogs which will delight in your slugs and snails. Birds will nest in your hedge so try to avoid it being beautifully cut as this will deter them. If it is possible, don't finally cut it until all the berries have been eaten as this is fuel for the winter months (this is not always in your control). Ivy is the last plant to flower and will be covered in insects of many kinds. A small amount in the hedge is good.

Do lawns have to be just grass? Like this they are a desert. Daisies and clover will be visited by bees, especially the very, very small ones. Moss lines birds' nests. Chemicals on lawns kill worms and leather jackets (immature crane flies). Birds eat both of these, and it's wonderful watching blackbirds eat worms. The charity Songbird Survival has funded the University of Sussex to do research on pesticides used in gardens. House Sparrows decreased by 12% where any pesticide was used, 25% by glyphosate and 39% by metaldehyde. Glyphosate decreased robins and great tits; Mecoprop lowered numbers of chaffinches, blackbirds, dunnocks and great tits.

Caterpillars can be picked off by hand but are also food for fledgelings. If you have a wasps next and it's out of the way, leave it. Wasps eat greenfly as do ladybirds and they are your friends. Also the winter will rot the nest and it will disappear. Green woodpeckers will come and eat your ants.

My pond is 1m x 50cm. I regularly get newts and frogs even though it is small. Birds drink from it. This year I even had a grasssnake.

Bird baths are good for drinking and baths. I love watching the water go everywhere.

If everyone in Coaley did just one of these things we would make a big difference to our local wildlife.
