30 years of Musichall in Coaley, and bookings as high as ever. A huge compliment to all involved in the shows over the years, and perhaps even moreso now with modern life offering even more distractions and comittments.

Two performers, Maureen Wibberley and Paul Cheshire were on stage for that first Musichall in 1982, and every one since, never imagining they would still be needed to perform 30 years later, but such has been the success of Coaley Musichall.

Many from the village have "Tread the Boards" during those 30years, far too many to mention, and many of them are still giving invaluable support, working in the Bar, Kitchen, Front of house, Painting scenery, Helping with costumes etc,to ensure we maintain a high standard, and everything runs smoothly.

We, the Church Social Committee, and the P.C.C.are grateful for their continuing dedication.

The enthusiastic group I now have on stage, ensures a show full of energy, fun nonsense and great singing, so the most difficult part for me remains the programme content, the themes, and finding new and professional-amateurs for the star spots.

This year themes abounded. Should it be The Olympics, Pearls for our 30th year, Diamonds for the Queen's Jubilee Year? Without doubt, one section had to be... MUSICHALL...then trawling through song books, I realised there were dozens and dozens of songs, popular for generations, but now mostly locked in our memories, songs about palaces kings and queens and soldiers, so in this Jubilee Year, it had to be a patriotic theme.

Yes, Musichall 2012 was a truly British Show. Scotland has its bagpipes and swirling skirts, Ireland, its Caliphs and Riverdance Wales its Eistedfods and Male Voice Choirs, and what has

Wales its Eistedfods and Male Voice Choirs, and what has England? Musichall of course, born in the Gin Joints of Edwardian London, a mass of humorous and sad songs evolved on life among the poor in Cockney London.

London, now a beautiful and Iconic City steeped in history, our wonderful Queen of 60 years, plus all the colour and pageantry of our Heritage. There was so much to sing about, and so we did, from Changing Guard at Buckingham Palace (beautifully painted for us by Giles Sims and Chris Prout) lifelike appearances, with the help of face masks, of six members of the Royal Family, through to Rule Britannia and Land of Hope and Glory.

The Choruses were without doubt on top form, and three short sketches added much humour to the show, but our two young guests, Emily Jenner and Kieran Powell put the whole show on a different level. 17 yr old Emily delighted everyone with her flawless performance on saxaphone, displaying her versatility as she mixed atmospheric love-songs, Take the A-train, through to a frenetic Hungarian Dance duet with our accompanist, Paul Phillips.

Kieran, just 16yrs old had perfected the art of ventriloquism to the very highest standard, and had the audience rocking with laughter as he talked to, and sang with a variety of animals, birds and other things to a degree of artistry which had audiences almost believing they were real. His voice, singing was incredible, and it is little wonder that he wins amateur contests across the country. We hope this will not be last appearances at Coaley for either Emily or Kieran.

Once again, we, The Church, in Coaley, are indebted to everyone for working-giving-and supporting our Anniversary Musichall.







# Dog Fouling Continues to be a Problem!

New Dog Waste Bins on order to help with the problem. The council have received more complaints about dog waste in inappropriate areas. 2 new dog waste bins are on order and will be sited one at Hamshill and the other at Far Green. Dog waste on our pavements and on the playing fields is a



continuing problem. There are already 2 dog waste bins in the centre of the village, one by the side of the playing field and one in the Village Hall car park. We encourage all dog owners to be responsible and collect their dog's waste disposing of it either in their refuse bags at home or in the appropriate dog waste bins. It is essential that we keep our playing field clean so it is a safe environment for children to play, the public to walk and sports events to take place.

Dog fouling is antisocial and is a health hazard. Many councils are having increasing problems with dog fouling and recent discussions on the issue have taken place at Stroud District Council. The use of 'The Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005' extends the provision of the adoption and enforcement of dog control orders to Town and Parish Councils. In these cases, the Town or Parish Council have the power to authorise members of their staff to serve fixed penalties for any witnessed offences in relation to littering, dog control orders and fly posting. We hope to avoid having to use such measures and urge all dog owners to responsibly clear up their dog mess.

All dogs and cats should be regularly wormed to prevent them carrying the toxicara worm. Toxocariasis can cause eye disorders and potential blindness and can be a serious health hazard especially to children. It can also cause flu like symptoms. Toxocara eggs are not infectious until they embryonate. This is usually at least 2 – 3 weeks after they have been deposited by a dog. Therefore freshly deposited faeces are not infectious, and you can safely clear up after your dog. A single dog mess can contain approximately 1million microscopic eggs.

Thank you to all of you who do clear up after your pet. Please help to keep Coaley clean and pleasant.

# Village Agent

I would like to draw your attention to some information which I found enlightening and may be of help to you.

Should you be so unfortunate as to find your sight is deteriorating do get an eye test as soon as possible. If it is impossible to get to an optician it is likely you can arrange a home visit. Telephone your optician, and if they are unable to help please telephone me. Around 250,000 people in the UK are diagnosed with Macular Degeneration. If you are so unfortunate it is vital to catch the condition early as "wet" degeneration can be treated, which may prevent further deterioration and possibly even repair some of the damage to the eyes.

Some people with the onset on Macular Degeneration may suffer from hallucinations but are well in themselves, lucid and not confused. It could be that they have Charles Bonnet Syndrome. Village Agents had been given a talk by Gloucestershire County Association for the Blind and were told about this syndrome. The Casualty Eye Clinic verified that, other than giving reassurance and making sure the light conditions are at their best, there is nothing to be done. However the likelihood is that the hallucinations will stop within 18 months. Every case is different and though the whole experience may be alarming at

least knowing that nearly everyone will get better is helpful. This is not a mental illness.

It is very important to get a diagnosis by your doctor if you are experiencing anything of this



nature as there are often logical explanations such as having an infection or a lack of fluids.

Please telephone me if you like to discuss this article, but in any case it is advisable to get your eyes tested regularly. You may not have to pay, your optician will be able to let you know what to expect.

IT ALWAYS HAPPENS TO OTHER PEOPLE!! OR DOES IT ??

No, it can happen to anyone. I sadly report an incident that happened to a very close member of our family when a day spent at Cheltenham Races with friends turned into a horror

After a pleasant and successful day, this relative stopped at previously unknown premises to enjoy a quiet drink whilst waiting for his friends. The next thing he knew was waking up lying at the back of the premises on a stone floor at 4.00am the following morning, head throbbing, with two burly bouncers pushing him into a Taxi. All cash he had on him had gone, and he thought he had nodded off for half an hour only. With no money to pay for the Taxi, he asked the driver to take him to a Cashpoint where he would withdraw some cash. The Bank declined his request.... Insufficient funds!!!

The following morning he contacted his Bank, only to be told that over £48,000 had been withdrawn during the previous night from various Cash Machines in TEWKESBURY!!!

He immediately contacted the Police. The premises were closed down, but all personnel had vanished. Fortunately events of the previous evening had been captured on C.C.T.V. as Fraud Squad Police had suspected illegal activities, and were just waiting for

His drink had been spiked, rendering him virtually unconscious for over 7 hours during which his Bank Card had been taken from his wallet, his Account cleared, and then returned to his wallet.

His mobile phone had also been switched off to avoid him being awoken early.

It could indeed have been far worse had he awoken and shown any resistance. He could have been seriously injured or worse.

So please take extra caution when using Cash Machines. These gangs we are told have sophisticated technology capable of obtaining P.I.N. No's and card No's not only at Cash Points, but also from sophisticated mobile phones.

BE CAREFUL..... BE WARNED..... It doesn't ONLY happen to other people.

Despite previous warnings, there has been a further increase in Distraction Burglaries.

Be very cautious when dealing with callers at your home. Do not allow entry - Check Identity - Call the Company they represent if neccessary.

Recent increases in the cost of fuel will inevitably lead to numerous other price increases and subsequently, an increase in Crime generally, and especially thefts from oil tanks and property

Please continue to report abandoned or suspicious vehicles.

## Village Agent News

We have been wondering if there are restrictions on when one can drive after a having a general anaesthetic. We understand there is considerable pressure these days for day case surgery and so anaesthetics are often arranged for rapid recovery so that a patient may be discharged just a few hours later. However, effects will last and the patient must be discharged into the care of another who will drive them home.

A taxi can be used (but not a bus) and only if there is someone at home to receive the patient. Under no circumstances should a person drive on the same day as having received a general anaesthetic. Gloucester Royal Hospital has confirmed the driving should be avoided until 24 hours after the anaesthetic and even important decisions such as signing legal documents should be avoided for this time as judgement in impaired.

Patients should also check with their insurers who may have additional requirements, which might leave the driver uninsured if an accident should occur. Patients should take the advice if any is given. Failure to follow the advice would probably invalidate the insurance. Any disability notifiable at law should be reported to insurers. If the patient follows doctors advice, feel safe to drive and then drives in a reasonable way they would be covered by their insurance.

#### **Bonfires**

Whilst the good weather is with us it is an ideal opportunity to get out in the garden, please when lighting a bonfire consider your neighbours. If you are experiencing continuous problems with a neighbour then the guidelines from Stroud District Council is to keep a note of the dates and times of the bonfires and contact the Environmental Protection Team, Stroud District Council, Ebley Mill. Stroud, Glos, GL5 4UB, Tel: 01453 754478 or email your enquiry to environmental .health@stroud.gov.uk. They will follow up your complaint confidentially, although they may need you to give evidence if they prosecute. The initial approach will usually be an informal letter, giving advice about better ways of disposing of the rubbish and explaining about the problems from bonfires. If this is not successful, and the bonfires continue, the investigating officer will decide if the fires are causing a statutory nuisance, if so they will take further action under the Environmental Protection Act 1990.

#### About April

Gemstone: Diamond Flower: Sweet Pea

No one knows for certain how April got its name, but it may have come from the Latin word 'aperire' which means 'to open'. April is the month when in the northern hemisphere buds begin to open and things start to grow again after the winter.

#### April Fools Day

April begins with a day of fun and jokes –
April Fools Day. The origins of the custom are unknown, but it has been kept 'alive' for hundreds of years.

The First of April, some do say Is set apart for All Fools Day; But why the people call it so, Not I, nor they themselves do know.

The arrival of the cuckoo is the signal that spring has come - it arrives sometime in mid-April and is said to sing from St. Tiburtius' Day (14th April) to St. John's Day (24th June).

The cuckoo is arguably the UK's best known summer visitor. Spending the winter months in Africa, cuckoos arrive back in the UK during late April or early May, timing the arrival to match the breeding season of its 'hosts' species here. The main hosts in the UK are the Dunnock, Meadow Pipit, Pied Wagtail and the Reed Warbler. As one of the most infamous brood parasites, cuckoos

lay their eggs in the nests of other birds with precision timing. Once hatched, the chick ejects the legitimate occupants and then gets fed by its new and unsuspecting foster parents true masters of deception.

## **Summer Visitors**

*House Martins:* These lovely migrant birds fly from Africa to nest in the British Isles, many in our area. They spend a long time making their mud nests under the eaves of houses. Please be tolerant of their building habits. The birds do not cause too much mess and they become distressed if all their hard work is destroyed. If house martins cannot raise their brood, yet another species will be endangered.

Swallows: Always return to their old nest sites, so please make access to them. If for security, access has to be shut, swallows will fly through small opening in order to reach their traditional nesting sites.

Swifts: their nesting sites, some of which are centuries old, are fast disappearing. They require an access tunnel of at least 18" long with a small entrance hole. Swifts are believed to spend as much as 9 months a year on the wing and are known to nap whilst flying. Should you require any advice about these birds or

how to obtain artificial nesting boxes and how to erect them, please contact Glos Wildlife Trust
