Dance, with Top Hat, or Isobel (Farmer) and Sue Withers as two ladies from the Salvation Army, Happy Eliza - Contented Iane.

What broadband speeds mean

Broadband speed is the rate at which data is sent (uploaded) or received (downloaded) through your connection. It is measured in kilobits per second (Kbps) or megabits per second (Mbps). The best way to understand all this is to look at what different speeds allow you to do on the Internet.

At 512Kbps you can:

- load a typical web page in 1.6 secs
- download a 5-minute song in 1 min 30 secs
- stream* low quality video

At 2Mbps you can:

- load a web page in 0.4 secs
- download a song in 20 secs
- stream medium quality video

At 8Mbps you can:

- load a web page virtually instantaneously
- download a song in 2.5 secs
- stream TV quality video



The 'Out of the Mist' story

'Now hear ye all this, good men of Bamburgh,' shouted the cloaked man over the rumble of storm thunder. The audience peered into the darkness. What came next is history in the making: he announced plans for a local lifesaving service. It was the opening chapter of a story that ends with the Royal National Lifeboat Institution as we know it today.

Two hours later, after an emotional journey, the audience filed out of the hall into the village. This wasn't 18th century Bamburgh in Northumberland but 21st century Cranham, a tiny community in Gloucestershire. The play they had just seen - Out of the Mist - brought key moments in the RNLI's history to the stage: the first days of lifeboating, the formation of the RNLI and the deeds of famous rescuers.

Now the play has become a full theatre production.

A sailing trip with a family friend gave Alan Tyson his first face-to-face experience of the RNLI. Royal Marine Jason Ward had been posted to Norway and planned to sail there. Alan accompanied Jason with some other pals, and they were sailing off the Norfolk coast when the Great Yarmouth and Gorleston all-weather lifeboat drew close.

"They explained that they had been out training when they saw us in dangerous on Thursday 29 March, matinee and evening, shallow water," says Alan. "They kindly escorted us to the station and showed us around. It made me realise that lifeboat crew are unsung heroes: all down- to-earth and extremely professional.

Jason championed the RNLI for the rest of his life, which sadly ended two years later. He was killed in a helicopter crash while serving in the Iraq war.

"The whole experience planted a seed of support for the RNLI that grew and grew," says Alan. "I initially wanted to create a small presentation that would raise funds, but, as I read about the history, it fast became a stage docu-drama." That perseverance has paid off with another successful production in the Gloucestershire village of May Hill.

And now, Out of the Mist will be produced for the RNLI in association with Jenny Wren Productions on the stage of the award winning Parabola Arts Centre, Cheltenham, and Friday 30 March, evening, as part of the theatre's Creative Community initiative.

Valentine Shortbread Hearts



Ingredients:

225a/8oz plain flour.

150g/5.5oz butter, cut into small pieces.

125g/4.5oz caster sugar. 1 tsp vanilla flavouring.

Extra caster sugar, for dusting.

- 1 Lightly grease a baking tray or line with greaseproof paper. 2 Sieve the flour into a large bowl and rub in the butter pieces
- with your fingers until it resembles breadcrumbs.
- 3 Stir in the caster sugar and vanilla flavouring then bring the mixture together using your hands to make a firm dough.
- 4 Lightly flour work surface, then roll out the dough to a thickness of 2.5cm/1 inch. Cut out approx 16 hearts with a heartshaped biscuit cutter about 5cm/2 inches across and 2.5cm/1
- 5 Place the hearts on the prepared baking tray and bake in a preheated oven, 180C/350F/Gas Mark 4, for 15-20 mins until light golden in colour.
- 6 Transfer to a cooling rack and when ready to serve, dust with the extra caster sugar

Village Agent

I would like to draw your attention to some information which I found enlightening and may be of help to you.

Should you be so unfortunate as to find your sight is deteriorating do get an eye test as soon as possible. If it is impossible to get to an optician it is likely you can arrange a home visit. Telephone your optician, and if they are unable to help please telephone me. Around 250,000 people in the UK are diagnosed with Macular Degeneration. If you are so unfortunate it is vital to catch the condition early as "wet" degeneration can be treated, which may prevent further deterioration and possibly even repair some of the damage to the eyes.

Some people with the onset on Macular Degeneration may suffer from hallucinations but are well in themselves, lucid and not confused. It could be that they have Charles Bonnet Syndrome. Village agents had been given a talk by Gloucestershire County Association for the Blind and were told about this syndrome. The Casualty Eye Clinic verified that other than giving reassurance and making sure the light conditions are at their best there is nothing to be done. However the likelihood is that the hallucinations will stop within 18 months. Every case is different

Warm Home Discount Scheme

I would like to tell you about The Warm Home Discount Scheme (WHD), which came into operation in April 2011, replacing many of the Social Tariff Discount schemes offered by Energy Companies. We understand the WHD is offered for electricity consumption only.

Energy companies who are participating in this Scheme are:

Atlantic, British Gas, EDF Energy, E.ON, Equigas, Manweb, M&S Energy, Npower, Sainsbury's Energy, Scottish Gas, Scottish Hydro, Scottish Power, Southern Electricity, SSE, Swalec and Utility Warehouse.

If you qualify under the scheme you will receive an automatic £120 discount on your electricity bill for winter 2011/2012, as well as for the next 3 winters. You will automatically qualify for the discount if you receive the Guarantee Credit element of Pension Credit on the qualifying date, which is 11 September 2011. Your energy supplier should send you a letter confirming your entitlement. We understand letters are to be sent out from mid November 2011 to the end of February 2012.

Anyone who receives some Savings Credit element of Pension Credit as well the Guarantee Credit, or only the Savings element of Pension Credit will not automatically qualify for the discount. If you are in this situation we suggest you contact your energy supplier to discuss your possible eligibility for the discount.

Under the WHD, electricity suppliers may also give a discount of £120 to some customers who don't automatically qualify. Most suppliers have identified these customers as those who receive a means-tested benefit, such as Income Support, Income Based Jobseekers Allowance, Income Based Employment Support Allowance, and who either have a child under 5 years, or receive a disability benefit.

Money for this scheme is limited and some suppliers have set a cap on the number of customers, who don't automatically qualify, they are prepared to allow the discount to. Instead they are offering the discount on a first-come, first-served basis.

It is very important to get diagnosed by your doctor if you are experiencing anything of this nature as there are often logical explanations such as having an infection or a lack of fluids.

Please telephone me if you like to discuss this article, but in any case getting you should get your eyes tested regularly. You may not have to pay, your optician will be able to let you know what to expect.
